## When, Where, and How to Early Vote

All registered Massachusetts voters are eligible to vote early

You can vote at any early voting location in your city or town

Early voting starts on October 24th and ends on November 4th

Requested ballots will be mailed starting on Oct. 24th.

Early voting ballots are different from absentee ballots; anyone can request an early voting mail-in ballot

## **About Early Voting in MA**

Governor Deval Patrick signed the early voting law in 2014, requiring cities and towns have at least one early voting site open during a 10-day window

This is the first year that early voting is available to Massachusetts voters

Early voting will be held from October 24th - November 4th

Early voting makes voting more accessible, increasing turnout especially for low-income voters, voters of color, young voter, and those who may have difficulty getting to the polls on Election Day

Some town clerks anticipate a 25-30% increase in voter turnout due to early voting All valid early ballots will be counted on Election Day, along with ballots cast at polling places

When Governor Baker slashed funding for early voting, MAc Democratic legislature overrode his veto to ensure that early voting would be available for MA voters
